Pastor's Corner

Dear Plymouth Church,

The changing of the calendar year sends me into reflections on the passage of time, reflecting on what has been learned and what has been lost, and what to make with the shape of my life?

2024 is the new year. I remember when the year 2000 seemed like something big and meaningful. How can that be a generation ago?

It can be distressing to realize how fast the time goes, but I think that discomfort can be helpful, especially if it helps me to be aware of just how valuable is the time we have. It makes me more conscious of the gift of this day—and more intentional about how to spend this valuable time.

I was struck by a reflection from the writer Anne Lamott, from her column last month in the Washington Post. She described this outing with her dear friend:

Pammy and I went shopping a few weeks before she died. I needed a new dress for a concert with a new boyfriend. At the time, she was in a wheelchair and a wig. I came out of the dressing room wearing a short dress, tighter than normal, and asked if it made me look big in the hips.

She looked me in the eyes, calmly. "Annie," she said, "you don't have that kind of time."

That sentence shocked me into getting real about how I was spending my life. We know by a certain age the great palace lies of the culture — if you buy or do or achieve this or that, you will be happy and rich. Nope. Love and service make us rich.

Lamott is sharing good news here, and finding new language for the teachings of Jesus. This time is valuable, and it is love and service that make us rich.

I'll see you in church!

From Dillon's Desk

Dear friends,

They might have been Punjabi, the wise ones who traveled to Bethlehem looking for a Great One. It's possible they were Persian. Most likely they were Zoroastrians by religion, that ancient faith that precedes even Judaism. At the time and place Jesus was born, religious pluralism was in full force. Roman roads led everywhere, and international trade was bustling. Many different faiths and philosophies bumped into one another, and the great teachers of each religion swapped theological ideas, music, and stories. Besides that, the new cities brought together people who had been raised in other countries, or out in the country on farms or in villages.



Saturday, January 6, is the Feast of the Epiphany, the end of Christmastide and the day we remember the visit from the Wise Ones. We will celebrate Epiphany together as a church the following day, on Sunday, January 7. As we approach Epiphany, I invite you to take to heart the many images that arise from this holiday. Not just the "We Three Kings" song that is so familiar to many of us, but the entire gift -giving tradition at Christmas comes from the story of learned astronomers from the East bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the child Jesus.

In Matthew's gospel, Jesus' first visitors were not poor Jewish shepherds (as they are in Luke), but rather interfaith, intercultural travelers of high estate and high esteem. Expectations differed widely about who Jesus was to be, and people from faraway places brought their expectations too.

This begs the question, for all of us who find ourselves as faithful seekers today: Who is Jesus to be for us? What do we expect? And what do we bring?

Of all the holidays, and of all the seasons, perhaps Epiphany is the one that most speaks to our age and place: an abundance of seeking and searching, foreigners and travelers, attention to the stars and the signs, and the dire need to smartly sift through the hopes and expectations about what will really save us.

May God be with us as we continue on our journey.


Sunday, February 4






Sugar Plum Workshop 2023

We look forward to sharing our art while listening to meditative music.




